I have a dream that one day this nation will **rise up** and **live out** the true meaning of its **creed**: "We hold these truths to be self-evident: that all men are created equal."

I have a dream that one day on the red hills of Georgia the sons of former slaves and the sons of former

slave owners will be able to sit down together at the table of brotherhood.

I have a dream that my four little children will one day live in a nation where they will not be judged by the color of their skin but by the **content** of their character. I have a dream today...

I have a dream that one day every valley shall be **exalted**, every **hill** and mountain shall be made **low**, the **rough** places will be made **plain**, and the **crooked** places will be made **straight**, and the glory of the Lord **shall** be revealed, and all **flesh** shall see it together.

Vocabulary:

- **rise up** begin to fight in order to protest or remove a ruler or government
- live out do the things you have dreamed of doing
- creed statement of the basic beliefs of a religion; an idea or set of beliefs that guides the actions of a person or group
- former existing in the past; ancient; previous
- owners people who have (something) as property
- brotherhood feelings of friendship, support, and understanding between people
- content composition of something
- exalt- raise (someone or something) to a higher level
- hill usually rounded area of land that is higher than the land around it but that is not as high as a mountain
- low not tall; opposite of high
- rough having a surface that is not even
- plain large, flat open area of land
- **crooked** not straight
- straight not having curves, bends, or angles
- shall used to say that something is expected to or will happen in the future
- **flesh** the physical nature of a person rather than the mind or spirit
